

Message from ANMS-FBG President: Satish Rao, MD, PhD, FRCP, FACG



Astonishingly, October is here and one year has gone by since the last issue of The Recorder, and in the interim what a terrific journey has it been for our society. Hardly had the ink dried on the many laurels we received for hosting our NGM 2010 meeting at Boston, the ANMS-FBG council were hard at work deliberating on our members needs and the future of our society. Their enthusiasm culminated in plans for organizing a first ever 3-in-one event for 2011: a postgraduate course, a 2-day scientific meeting and a Young Investigator Forum. Additionally, 2011 witnessed many other landmark events that I will summarize below.

What have we accomplished? Fresh from our most successful ANMS-FBG meeting in September 2011 in St Louis, I am pleased to report that our 6th Postgraduate Course on Gastrointestinal Motility and Neurogastroenterology in Clinical Practice attracted over 275 attendees who gave us rave reviews. 37 faculty did a spectacular job with Live Demonstrations, didactic lectures, interactive workshops and case-based discussions. This was followed by ANMS-FBG 16th biennial Scientific meeting (after a 6 yr gap) that was enthusiastically

received by our members with 375 attendees who presented 185 abstracts including 40 oral abstract presentations. This was blended with 20 brilliant state-of- the-art lectures using a bench to bedside format, hot topics in basic and clinical sciences and 3 theme-based translational symposia. The highlight was the **2**nd **ANMS Tripuraneni Oration**, our Society's highest honor. Professor Jeffery I. Gordon from Washington University gave an oration on Intestinal Microbiome and its link to gastrointestinal and other diseases.



Finally, the **15 young investigators** who participated in an exclusive and superb mentor-mentee program, walked away with fresh ideas and hopefully inspired to be future leaders.

In January, the Council held its 5th annual retreat in Scottsdale, Arizona, where we developed strategic goals for our society. Each of our 7 committees, clinical, research, education, membership, liaison/international affairs, finance, Pharma/FDA relations held extensive group discussions and laid out plans that were debated by the council. ANMS-FBG and the European Society Neurogastroenterology and Motility have entered into agreement to form the **Federation** Neurogastroenterology and Motility (FNM). This body is charged with hosting a biennial international scientific meeting, with the next meeting in September 2012 at Bologna, Italy, and FNM will replace the Joint international NGM meetings. The Asian Neurogastroenterology and Motility Association (ANMA) has agreed to join the FMN and will host a FNM meeting in 2014. Our colleagues from Latin America and Australia have signed MOUs to participate as associate members of FNM, and they will be represented on the Executive Board and Scientific Planning Committees of the FNM.

In keeping with our mission to promote science and research, 2 competitive research grants were awarded last year. ANMS-FBG is pleased to announce support for **2 new research grants for 2012** (see RFA below; deadline November 11, 2011). I encourage all members to apply and make use of this opportunity.

Thanks to the generous support of our sponsors, the Clinical Training Program for GI Fellows remains very successful and 20 fellows have received one month training in 2010-11, at 10 adult and pediatric Motility Centers of Excellence. Also, we have embarked on developing several ANMS-FBG Consensus Guidelines and Position papers and will be partnering with ESNM for these projects.

We are also engaged in a Pocket Guide and Flash Card project for key clinical areas such as IBS, Constipation, Gastroparesis and Dysphagia that will be of immense use to clinicians nationwide and will become available in spring 2012.

The clinical practice and education committees have developed over 12 patient education brochures on common topics such as constipation, gastroparesis, GERD, IBS, etc and on common procedures such as esophageal/anorectal manometry or pH testing or biofeedback therapy that will be extremely beneficial to patients. Given that there is misinformation and poor understanding of these conditions, and very little authoritative information on these topics or procedures, these brochures should fill a muchneeded void for our patients. The **Membership Committee** has initiated an excellent survey of our members to ascertain their needs and to involve the membership-at-large with our strategic directions and goals. Please participate in this important endeavor that will help to shape the future of our society.

The **Education Committee** is spearheading efforts to improve the GI Core Curriculum and training in Neurogastroenterology & GI Motility. We will partner with sister societies to develop better educational materials and assessment tools to improve knowledge and training in this subspecialty.

Where are we going?

We have another full year of activities planned to meet our member needs including the **7**th **Postgraduate Course** with Live demonstrations and a **Young Investigator Forum** that will be held over 3 days in July 2012 in Chicago. Their efforts will be supported by the Education Committee led by Adil Bharucha, John Pandolfino, Carlo DiLorenzo and Clinical Practice Committee led by Lin Chang.

We will also be asking you to participate in many electronic surveys including elections for new Council members and President-Elect, and a ballot for the name of our society as mandated by our merger agreements.

The Clinical Training Program Directors will be meeting in a month at ACG to revise the MCQs and teaching slide deck and resolve any concerns. ANMS-

FBG continues to lead efforts on the issuance of **new CPT codes and FDA** biomarker initiatives, and will partner with our industry sponsors and sister GI institutions including IFFGD, NIH and visits to the National Capitol to promote our field. Plans are also underway for a research/strategic group summit with industry (pharma & device), FDA and NIH.

I am grateful for the outstanding support of our esteemed Council, and to each of you who have advised me during the past year and to our generous sponsors and friends.

As the leaves are changing color and the autumn air has become crisper with a whiff of cold breeze, and the global economy seesaws, thanks to your dedication, I am pleased to report from the warmer shores of Augusta, Georgia that our society is in a strong position, both academically and financially, and I am confident that we will build a great future for our society.

Report on 16th Scientific Meeting, Hyatt Regency, St Louis, September 16-18, 2011. The 16th ANMS-FBG Scientific meeting was planned and executed in a record 10 month period, owing in large part to the extraordinary efforts of the Scientific team comprising of Satish Rao (Chair), Lin Chang, Keith Sharkey, Gary Mawe, Kirsteen Browning, Michael Vaezi, and Jeff Lackner. The committee ensured fair balance between clinical and basic science and used a bench to bedside approach for all State-of-the-art lectures and symposia. Subjects chosen were not only topical and controversial but highlighted new developments, and represented the broad interests and diverse fields including interests of our FBG colleagues. Also, there were several pediatric topics and speakers, which was enthusiastically received by our pediatric colleagues. Members submitted abstracts into one of 14 categories and breakdown shown below. We hope to revise some of the abstract categories in the future.

The abstracts were evaluated by 14 separate groups of abstract reviewers and scored for their merit based on which they were selected for oral or poster presentations. Finally, 185 abstracts were presented that included 40 oral abstracts. Over 30 State-of-the-art lectures were given in 5 concurrent sessions and 3 theme-based symposia that attracted large audiences and enthusiastic debate.

This was followed by 10 plenary session oral abstracts. The highlight of the morning session was the 2nd ANMS Tripuraneni Oration, our Society's highest honor. Professor Jeffery I. Gordon from Washington University was the recipient this year and he gave a superb and brilliant oration entitled "Dining in with trillions of fascinating friends: exploring our human gut microbiome in health and disease".

The evening banquet was attended by 300 guests and was held at the St. Louis Jefferson Memorial Arch - a tribute to our forefathers and pioneers. This was a truly memorable evening that included tram visits to the top, viewing the westward journey museum and a superb dinner that was ably planned by our local organizing team: Prakash Gyawali, Charlene Prather, and Greg Sayuk. It was fitting to have this meeting at

St Louis, a place where Ray Clouse worked and championed the understanding and treatment of many esophageal diseases including the pioneering work on high resolution esophageal manometry. Our preliminary evaluation of the meeting was generally positive.

Digestive System Motility Biomarker Qualification Project Co-sponsored by Food and Drug Administration and ANMS-FBG Joint Society Report by Michael Camilleri

The ANMS-FBG continues to have dialog with FDA on Biomarker qualification. Given the regulations on quality control beyond the need to document performance characteristics and responsiveness to therapy, the Council decided that the biomarkers in motility and sensation that are likely to meet approval by FDA are those that include the detailed quality control characteristics that are typically prepared by device manufacturers. Therefore, the ANMS-FBG will propose partnership with such device industries to apply for Biomarker Qualification in lieu of the prior "test case" of colonic transit by scintigraphy.

The Research Committee led by Helen Raybould reviewed several meritorious applications for 2010-2011 and awarded two ANMS Research Grants to outstanding basic and translational projects. Grant awardees are: Gerard Clarke from the University College Cork entitled "Kynurenine Metabolites as Novel Translational Biological Markers of Irritable Bowel Syndrome (IBS): Relationship to Gastrointestinal Function, Cognition and Co-morbid Depression" and Miriam Goebel-Stengel from Charité University Medical Center entitled "Role of brain-derived neurotrophic factor in irritable bowel syndrome."

2011-2012 ANMS Research Grant Program The ANMS will again offer the research grants program in 2011. The number of awards and dollar amount will depend on the success of fund raising efforts, but the ANMS plans to offer a minimum of two awards at \$30,000 each. The awards are intended to facilitate development of larger extramural grant applications and to promote career development of young investigators. The submission deadline will be November 11, 2011. Award notification will be made my mid-December, 2011 and the award start date will be January, 2012. Thirty seven faculty did a spectacular job with live demonstrations, didactic lectures and interactive workshops and case-based discussions.

A new Committee that includes nurses has already met and plans are underway for the 7th Postgraduate Course on Gastrointestinal Motility & Neurogastroenterology in Clinical Practice to be held in July, 2012 in Chicago.

The Clinical Training Program will train another 20-25 GI fellows during 2011-12. A Program Director's meeting will be held during ACG in Maryland, October 2011. We have 10 centers (Cedars Sinai Medical Center, Medical College of Wisconsin (Adult) and Children's Hospital of Wisconsin (Pediatrics), Milwaukee, WI, Georgia Health Sciences University, Augusta, GA, Nationwide Children's Hospital, Columbus, OH, Penn State Milton S. Hershey Medical Center, Hershey, PA, Temple University, Philadelphia, PA, Texas Tech, El Paso, TX, University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, MI, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, NC and Wake Forest University, Salem, NC).

This year, 20 GI Fellows will be spending a one month rotation at one of these 10 GI Motility Centers of Excellence to learn the art and practice of neurogastroenterology with a special emphasis on learning various GI motility procedures that are used to evaluate patients with these disorders. This should provide a strong foundation for a better understanding of GI motility problems and its treatment. The program has received excellent reviews by both the GI fellows and the faculty; the reviews were critically appraised and enthusiastically endorsed for continuation of the program by the ANMS Council,. 

The Clinical Practice Committee has been working on several exciting projects. One is Patient Education Brochures, which were developed by ANMS-FBG members and focus on common GI motility procedures and motility and functional GI conditions. Currently, we are offering brochures on achalasia, chronic intestinal pseudoobstruction, constipation, fecal incontinence, gastroparesis, gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD), and irritable bowel syndrome (IBS). There are also motility procedure brochures on anorectal manometry, biofeedback esophageal pH monitoring. Development of these educational brochures was possible through an unrestricted educational grant from Sucampo Pharmaceuticals, Inc. and Takeda Pharmaceuticals North America, Inc. The patient educational brochures are currently available on our ANMS-FBG website at www.motilitysociety.org.

The Clinical Practice committee is also implementing the formation of committees who will be critically reviewing the literature and writing Consensus and Guidelines papers field in the neurogastroenterology and motility. Dr. Reza Shaker has agreed to chair a committee on the evaluation and management of oropharyngeal dysphagia. Drs. Satish Rao and Adil Bharucha will be co-chairing a committee on anorectal biofeedback. Other topics that are currently being considered are esophageal motor disorders. A collaborative effort between ANMS-FBG (Chung Owyang, Emeran Mayer, Satish Rao, and Tony Lembo) and ESNM (Michael Fried, Stephan Müller-Lissner, Peter Whorwell) members is underway to write a systematic review and meta-analysis of drug treatment for chronic constipation and IBS with constipation. We are also planning to form a committee on Esophageal Motor Function.

One of the committee's newest endeavors is the development of **Guideline Pocketcards**. The ANMS-



FBG is collaborating with International Guidelines Center (IGC), which is an organization dedicated to providing evidence-based. clinical decision-support, quickreference tools to healthy care professionals. Pocketcards on the following topics currently being developed: 1) Constipation (Adil Bharucha and Satish Rao), Dysphagia (Benson Massey and Prakash Gyawali), Gastroparesis (Henry Parkman and Bill Hasler), and Irritable

Bowel Syndrome (Lin Chang and Tony Lembo). We hope to have them completed very soon.

IFFGD Annual Digestive Health Advocacy Day

On June 14 and 15, 2011 advocates from across the country traveled to Washington, DC for IFFGD's annual Digestive Health Advocacy Day. Several IFFGD staff members and representatives were joined by a diverse group of patients as well as one physician to educate their congressional representatives about functional GI and motility disorders and the need to fund research. Traveling in teams, we met with the Capitol Hill offices of Members of Congress and asked for support of a legislative agenda focused on increasing research and improving patient care. This included, 1) increased funding for the NIH; 2) introduction and passage of the Functional GI and Motility Disorders Research Enhancement Act; 3) including "Functional GI Disorders" within Department of Defense medical research activities; and 4) reintroduction and passage of the Pediatric Consortium Establishment Act.

Committee exploring consensus name for our merged ANMS-FBG Society Report by Henry Parkman

As mandated by the merger discussions, the ANMS-FBG council has charged the following committee, Henry Parkman (Chair), Bill Chey, Gianrico Farrugia, Bruce Naliboff and Reza Shaker to report to the council suggestions for an appropriate name(s) for our merged ANMS-FBG Society by December 2010. The committee has met on several occasions to discuss the need to have the name reflect the mission and goals of the merged society as well as align this with our journal, and on a more concrete level, the costs and legal implications involved in society name changes. Based on committee recommendations, the following options were approved by the Council and members will be asked to vote soon.

- 1. Continue to use American Neurogastroenterology and Motility Society (ANMS). This will help to maintain symmetry with names of other international societies (ESNM, ANMA) and our journal, and reflects our tradition and how we are perceived in the clinical arena (motility) and the term neurogastroenterology that has been encompassed by all members of our field.
- 2. Use a new name This might be a simple name with tag line: Examples: American Society of Neurogastroenterology (ASN) American Neurogastroenterology Society (ANS).

The ANMS Journal: Neurogastroenterology and Motility

At the end of 2011, the current editors of the journal, Drs. Keith Sharkey, Jan Tack, and Joe Szurszewski will step down after three years of active and committed service. The incoming editor's are Dr. Gianrico Farrugia, of the Mayo Clinic, Dr. Magnus Simren, of the University of Gothenburg, and Dr. Gary Mawe, from the University of Vermont. Dr. Farrugia will concentrate on basic science submissions, Dr. Simren will be the clinical science editor, and Dr. Gary Mawe will handle review articles for the journal. The current impact factor of the journal is 3.349.




High-resolution esophageal pressure topgraphy
