Guideline Pocket Cards are evidence-based and algorithmic clinical decision-making reference tools that cover diagnosis and treatment op-

**Young Investigator Forum** Fifteen young investigators will participate in the 10th Young Investigator Forum in September in Huntington Beach, California.

The Journal Management Committee met on September 6th, 2012 in Bologna, Italy. Neurogastroenterology and Motility continues to thrive. The key to the success is the very respectable journal impact factor - currently 3.414. The time to first decision has fallen from 32 to 27 days. The number of submissions has risen again during the past year and two Associate Editors were added to help with the increasing number of submissions - Sylvie Bradesi and Albert Bredenoord. Editors are Gianrico Farrugia, Magnus Simrén, and Gary Mawe. Current issues being addressed by the editors are the significant number of papers (25% in 2011) receiving no citations, the transition to online-only publication in 2014, and the introduction of a new Periodic Industry section.



# 2012 Meeting Highlights • Chicago, IL • Leuven, Belgium



**7th Postgraduate Course** held on July 27–29, 2012 in Chicago was organized by Adil Bharucha, John Pandolfino, and Satish Rao. The course was well received by over 300 attendees. The CME survey showed that the participants found the meeting to be very informative; they enjoyed the diverse line-up of speakers and were particularly impressed by the live demonstrations. Post-meeting survey results indicated that changes in practice performance were successful for 90% of physicians, nurses, and health care professionals who attended. In addition, 97% indicated that this meeting had a positive impact on their patient care.

Professor Nick Read from Sheffield, UK delivered the 3rd ANMS Tripuraneni Oration entitled *Irritable Bowels, Past, Present, and Future.* The highlights of the meeting included several new live demonstrations of motility procedures that had never been presented live and an outstanding program. A new feature was the Patient–Physician Forum, which involved one half day educating, informing, listening, learning, and interacting with patients and patient support groups. This Forum was very well received.

Our 9th Young Investigator Forum, held simultaneously, had fifteen participants who were chosen based on their scientific achievements. The Young Investigator Forum faculty Max Schmulson, *Chair*, Gregory Sayuk, *Co-Chair*, Kirsteen Browning, and Baharak Moshiree interacted closely with the young investigators. The comments of the participants reflected the high points of this interaction: "getting ideas on what directions to take my research by talking with not only faculty but also with the other speakers on the program," "beneficial experience meeting other professionals, presenting research, learning about mentorship, and career advancement and being able to participate in the clinical course too," and "personalized format, and meeting others in the field".

The 13th LBBB meeting was held on September 4–5, 2012 in Leuven, Belgium, immediately before the Joint International Neurogastroenterology and Motility meeting in Bologna, Italy. Lukas Van Oudenhove, Werend Boesmans, Ricard Farre, and Pieter Janssen, organized this very

successful meeting.

Young scientists "who showed the most potential in the field" were invited to present their latest findings. They came from all over the world – 9 from USA/Canada, 15 from Europe, 5 from Australia/New Zealand, and 1 from Brazil.

Keeping the great tradition of LBBB in mind, the meeting was set up as a forum for young investigators to propose and discuss novel ideas in neurogastroenterology. This structure provides a constructive learning environment where participants can gain understanding of the breadth of research in the field. The meeting also serves as an informal gathering for participants to meet peers and potential collaborators who have technological and intellectual tools unavailable in their own institutions.

The positive feedback from participants suggests that this meeting launches many fruitful collaborations. There is no doubt that LBBB boosts the careers of the next generation of leaders in neurogastroenterology, thereby maintaining and advancing the vigor of the field. The next LBBB meeting will be held prior to the joint international meeting of the Federation of Neurogastroenterology and Motility in Bangkok, Thailand, according to the conditions for future support set by ANMS.

# News from the International Foundation for Functional Gastrointestinal Disorders (IFFGD)

### We need your help

The Functional Gastrointestinal and Motility Disorders Research Enhancement Act has been reintroduced in the House of Representatives with bipartisan support as bill number H.R. 842. In addition to raising critical awareness of functional GI and motility disorders and the needs of patients, passage of H.R. 842 will grant the NIH new authority to initiate research projects; establish a Centers of Excellence Program in this area; coordinate research activities with the Department of Defense and the VA; and call on the FDA to improve review of treatments for FGIMDs. IFFGD has set up an action alert for people to contact their Representative about H.R. 842 at: www.iffgd.org/HR842action. It will only take a couple of minutes; the letter is already prepared and you can edit it if you like. We look forward to working with you to help The Functional Gastrointestinal and Motility Disorders Research Enhancement Act become law!
