Our biggest achievement was the publication of the Curriculum for Neurogastroenterology and Motility Training, a joint ANMS–ESNM project. The Curriculum was published in *Neurogastroenterology & Motility* in September 2018 to coincide with the Federation of Neurogastroenterology and

Motility meeting in Amsterdam (*Neurogastroenterol Motil* 2018;30:e13341). The Joint ANMS–ESNM Curriculum Task Force is evaluating neurogastroenterology and motility centers on both sides of the Atlantic using parameters from the published curriculum to identify centers that could



accept short- and longer-term neurogastroenterology and motility trainees interested in observerships and further training.

The ANMS Clinical Training Program accepts up to 25 trainees each year and assigns them to a monthlong observership in one of ten neurogastroenterology and motility centers of excellence in the United States. This program continues to attract wide interest among second and third year gastroenterology fellows interested in neurogastroenterology and motility. The ANMS is evaluating expansion of the Clinical Training Program to include practitioners interested in observerships. In addition, two one-day workshops are planned in 2019/2020 to provide trainees and practitioners with hands-on interpretation training in neurogastroenterology and motility function tests.

The ANMS is evaluating the process to incorporate the web-based high-resolution manometry training and certification module developed by John Pandolfino and Rena Yadlapati into its online platform. A web-based support system for trainees and early-career faculty to interface with senior faculty for advice and for interpretation of difficult function tests is also being considered.

of neurogastroenterology and motility. Our Grants team administers the ANMS small grants program, which



promotes the development of young investigators to become independent investigators, and is currently conducting a study of career trajectories of previous awardees. Our current and future goals include the exploration of new mechanisms to increase funding opportunities for investigators, support mid-career investigators, provide additional research travel awards, and ensure we are optimally serving the needs of the broader ANMS membership community. This past year, the ANMS received fifteen outstanding applications for research support. Each application was reviewed by three reviewers selected among the members of the Research Task Force on the basis of their expertise. After careful appraisal and discussion among our team members, two applications – one basic science and one clinical – were selected for funding and each was awarded \$30,000. The research grants continue to be an important feature of our society's efforts to support the career development of our junior investigators, and we plan to fund two grants, one basic and one clinical/translational, in 2019.

XVIth Little Brain Big Brain Meeting • Port Elliot, Australia

The XVIth Little Brain Big Brain meeting (LBBB) will take place March 22–25, 2020 at Port Elliot YHA in Port Elliot, South Australia. The LBBB meeting is a prestigious biannual meeting with a rich history, originally conceived in 1989 by junior investigators who recognized the need for a forum where they could present their work among their peers, exchange ideas, and promote open discussion and collaboration. This tradition has continued for nearly three decades of subsequent LBBB meetings, giving rise to many notable scientists and key opinion leaders in neurogastroenterology today. The XVIth LBBB meeting is organized by previous LBBB attendees: Luke Grundy (Flinders University), Lincon Stamp (University of Melbourne), Jaime Foong (University of Melbourne), Marlene Hao (University of Melbourne), and Simona Carbone (Monash University).

The meeting program will have three major themes: 1) gastrointestinal motility and sensation, 2) metabolism, and 3) inflammation, and will place emphasis on the intersection of basic, clinical, and translational research and the development of novel tools and targets. **The application deadline will be early July 2019**. About thirty highly talented junior investigators will be chosen to attend the XVIth LBBB meeting, which will be funded by a number of sources, including the pharmaceutical and biotech industries, the NIH, and international societies, including generous support provided by the American Neurogastroenterology and Motility Society, the European Society of Neurogastroenterology and Motility, and the Australasian Neurogastroenterology and Motility Association.


